Money Matters

Our proposed budget for 2019 was presented to the Board at its November meeting. It includes an increase in our monthly assessment, effective April 1,



2019 to \$208.68 (2.4% increase) per month. Unfortunately, our 2019 assessment income is not going to cover our anticipated operating expense for next year so we will, for the 3rd successive year, be borrowing from our prior year's budget surplus to balance our budget. The shortfall this year of approximately \$50,000 was primarily due to changing to a new landscaping contractor. Additionally, staff salaries, including the elimination of Winter Hours, continuation of VOLO communication system, outsourcing printing of our newsletter, booting of palm trees and trimming of crepe myrtles added to our accumulated expenses And, speaking of our tree expense, did you know we have 683 palm trees on property to be booted each year and 250 crepe myrtles to be trimmed and fertilized? We did make a change in employee medical coverage in October that should save us approximately \$11,000 per year. Our utility expense is anticipated to increase by 3% next year, yet our CPI limitation allows us only a 2.4% increase in assessment income. Also impacting our income is the continued growth of our Assessments Receivables. As of October 31, 2018, assessment receivables totaled \$37,570.63. Last year at this time it was \$33,505.02. We continue to aggressively pursue collection as evidenced by our legal fee, late fee, and owner interest receivables which total \$11,981.84 as of October 31st.

Our major concern, going forward, should be focused on how we can get back to balancing our operating budget without having to borrow from prior year's surplus. There are a very limited number of areas where we can make up a \$40,000-\$50,000 difference. Painting and building maintenance appears to be one of them. Evaluation of our painting cycle (now at approximately 9 years), may give us a bit of breathing room if we can recognize some savings in materials and labor by reducing expense in this area.

In addition to our operating budget, we need to consider Reserve Fund spending. The Board has approved spending up to \$50,000 for our playground upgrade, and up to \$20,000 for basketball and shuffleboard court resurfacing and a playground sidewalk this year. We have already spent approximately \$40,000 YTD from Reserves on pool decking refurb and pool tables and umbrellas. Tentative planned projects for next year include Drainage/Road Work, Partial Refurbish of Clubhouse Restrooms, and Construction of Storage area for tables & chairs, at an estimated total of \$80,000. Our 2017 Reserve Study projected that we'd need to start replacing our roofs starting in 2024 and ending in 2028 at an estimated expense of \$5 million. Because the

replacement will be phased over 5 years, we don't need the full 5 million upfront. In order to be able to fund that whole project though, we must take a critical look at our next 5 years of planned expense to assure we have the funds available to handle roof replacement. Each year we allocate 28% of our assessment income to our Reserves. For 2019, that'll amount to \$371,639. Assuming 2-3% inflation and interest earned on our accumulated funds, we should be able to handle the roof replacement. However, if we take on too many projects and expense in the next several years, we 'll come up short. As of October 31, 2018, our Reserve Funds total \$2,125,818,99 which does not include spending the approximate \$70K already approved by the board.

As we move into December, don't overlook the various community activities scheduled for the month that bring us all together. Rumors are Santa will be paying us a visit too!

He fantasizes that if he had been born 50 years earlier, he would have become a minstrel man. One of his musical heros, Dave Van Ronk, once described himself to me as a songster. That title might suit Roy as well, his music, a reflection of his long musical journey through the rich American cultural landscape of the last half of the 20th

Roy has the goods: the original, the bare-knuckle, the low-down . . . blues. Who can say they were friends with the Rev. Gary Davis, Pink Anderson and Robert Lockwood? And toured with Arthur Big Boy Crudup, Hot Tuna, JJ Cale & Bonnie Raitt? Roy can. He has the stories, the licks, and the mystery of timeless music in his fingers. He's been featured on a PBS special and interviewed by Terry Gross on "Fresh Air." He's also a regular at Fur Peace Ranch, where he teaches along with Jorma Kaukonen. When he brings his 'Tour Bus' to town, a one-man blues-fest ensues. He plays and he entertains, feeding us music and stories, and the evening is a celebration for us all. We're privileged to have Roy here to preserve—and extend—the tradition of great American blues music." (JAMES HIPP)
